### From John Braithwaite

It seems incredible that it's 15 years since myself as Festival Director and John Heydon, as Commercial Director, began our involvement. That was 2008/9, when the Sidmouth Folk Festival was reborn four years after the end of the Mrs Casey era.

We had no idea that the journey we would embark on would have included so many huge challenges and cataclysmic world events, from the banking crisis and wet summers to the Covid shutdown and subsequent rebuild. To meet these challenges and

survive needed a strong management team to bring Sidmouth back to the immense event it is today, reaching every corner of the folk genre in its 70th year. We had to learn new skills to adapt to a changing environment, in particular Covid, but with so much consistent support from our loyal customers, town businesses and clubs, the Town Council and of course the huge band of fabulous volunteers -over 6000 have helped to run the Festival during our tenure - we survived and blossomed.

We feel very happy and fulfilled to have helped bring Sidmouth back to its rightful place at the top of UK Folk Festivals. All we need to say is thank you to all our colleagues and Festival supporters. The new team of directors and their support networks have already proven their capabilities and are well-equipped to lead the festival into its next era. We look forward to seeing the Sidmouth Folk Festival thrive in the years to come.

- Prices in brackets are for Youth (12-17) or Under 25 for Ham & Bulverton shows
- All events are included in All-in-One tickets, except for the Pre-Festival Ham shows (001, 003, 102).
- Week, Weekend, and Day season tickets include all events for the relevant time period, except for the Pre-Festival Ham shows and the Saturday-Thursday Ham evening shows (266, 374, 487, 586, 683, 783).
- Bulverton-in-One tickets include all events in The Bulverton and Betsy's Lounge (The Bulverton)

### **Caller Listings Key**

A variety of teaching and calling styles are used at dances and dance workshops. The calling/teaching style of an event is indicated in the event descriptions using a code: (G), (A), or (P):

- (G) indicates that an event will be called using gendered role terms.
- (A) indicates that an event will be called using alternative ungendered role terms (e.g. lead/follow or larks/robins).
- (P) indicates that an event will be called without using role terms, emphasizing positional patterns, flow, and relationships between dancers (e.g. neighbour, opposite, people facing the windows).

Our comprehensive workshops programme of over 250 workshops features a dazzling array of music, dance, song and craft options, providing wonderful opportunities to indulge your curiosity and develop skills in a safe and welcoming community of professionals and learners.

Whether you want to dip into a one-off singing session, spend the week in a scratch band, learn a new instrument, or to be fascinated by our educational lecture series, there is something for you.

Many of the series' lead to showcase performances at the end of the week including Festival regulars **Sandra Kerr**, back at the helm of the Sidmouth Festival Choir, **John Kirkpatrick** with his Festival Concert Band and **Nick & Mary Barber** with the Big Band, and **Tim Walker's** Brass.

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

#### **Festival Fringe**

#### Folk by nature is collaborative and all about participation

Sidmouth's Festival Fringe is a part of the Folk Festival experience in the town, complementing the main Festival but not necessarily organised by it. Many enjoy participating, or just taking in the atmosphere. Fringe events are free but make a collection for the Festival. If you are at a Fringe session, please give generously to the Volunteer Collectors as often as you can.

Here is a rough guide of what goes on, plus places where things could happen:

#### **Sessions & Singarounds**

# **Collection of Pre-booked Tickets**

Collecting your wristbands and tickets - new for 2024

Please print the  $\Omega R$  codes found in your email receipt; or alternatively ensure  $\Omega R$  codes are downloaded to your mobile device and accessible when you arrive. Go to your pre-chosen collection point – either the Ham Box Office or the Campsite Box Office – and show your  $\Omega R$  codes to Box Office staff in order to collect season wristbands/tickets and camping tickets. For bus tickets, workshop books and extra programmes you will also need your email receipt/s that include those.

Individual Event Tickets: no need to go to a Box Office - simply show the QR code on the door of the Venue, there are no physical tickets issued for individual events.

# All-in-One Week Tickets

Give admission to all Festival events including The Ham Evening Concerts. They do not give entry to the Pre-Festival shows on Thursday 1st or Friday 2nd August, but you can get a discount. Priority entry to all events (just arrive at least 10 minutes before the event start) subject to capacity. Separate campsite charges apply.

# **All-In-One Weekend Tickets**

Have the same conditions as the All-In-One Week Tickets above but for Friday to Sunday.

# **Bulverton-In-One**

Give admission to all Bulverton events and also include full week's Camping. They do not give access to other venues and shows but discounts are available.

### **Week Tickets**

Give admission to all Festival events, except The Ham Evening Concerts and Pre-Festival shows, but you can get a discount. Priority entry to all events (just arrive at least 10 minutes before the event start) subject to capacity. Separate campsite charges apply.



# **Day and Weekend Tickets**

Day tickets can be purchased for one or more specific days during the week, they have the same conditions, for the relevant days, as the Week Tickets above. The Weekend Ticket covers Friday to Sunday. Ticket holders can purchase camping for the weekend or for the night before and/or the night of the relevant Day ticket, as appropriate.

### **Pre-Festival shows**

These shows are planned particularly for people from the region, local residents and early Festival arrivals and so are separately ticketed. All-in-One, Bulverton-in-One, Week and Weekend Festival Season ticket holders can buy tickets for these shows at a discount.

# **Advance Event Tickets**

Specific events at The Ham, Manor Pavilion and The Bulverton have advance event tickets on sale. The number of advance tickets available is limited. Event Tickets will be available at the door of almost all events, subject to space after Season and Advance ticket holders have been let in. Please note that the advance rate on event ticket sales finishes on 28 July and that the full rate (as printed in this programme) applies from 29 July.



Where advance tickets are not or no longer available for a specific event, tickets will then only be on sale at the door from about 10 minutes before the event starts, depending upon space. Seats are not pre-allocated and are available on a first-come, first-served basis. The number of tickets available overall has been limited to ensure that All-In-One, All-In-One Weekend, Week, Weekend and Day Ticket holders can gain access to an alternative event should their first choice be full.

# **Children & Youth Tickets**

Child (0-11) tickets are free. Unless marked otherwise, Youths (12-17) are half the adult price shown, rounded up to the nearest  $\mathfrak{L}$ .



# **Festival Car Park and Festival Bus**

# **Festival Car Park**

The Festival Car Park is in a grass field next to the Bulverton, located off the B3176 Bulverton Road and accessible via a one-way system from Broadway and Bickwell Lane. A short downhill walk will lead you to the Campsite bus stop, opposite the Campsite entrance and approx. 1.5 miles to town (see Bus Timetable).

Parking costs: Per day – £6 per car (arrival before 5.30pm) Evening – £3 per car (arrival after 5.30pm). Parking in the Festival Car Park is free to All In One, Bulverton In One, Week, Weekend and Day Ticket holders, Bulverton event ticket holders (for the night of the event) and Festival Campers.

Access: the Festival Car Park is based on farmland that is sloped and undulating and is not suitable for people who cannot traverse uneven, sometimes muddy, grassed ground. The Festival Car Park is not suitable for large vans/motor homes due to width restrictions.

# **Car Parking in Town**

There are no parking concessions in the town car parks for Festival ticket holders, traders or stallholders. We advise you to use public transport or the Festival Car Park and Bus wherever possible, thereby reducing the environmental impact and improving safety.

Sidmouth Cricket, Tennis & Croquet Clubs (main festival supporter) and Sidmouth Rugby Club (Festival Sponsor): Both clubs operates a car park during the Folk Festival. Follow the signs on the B3176 (Station Road) before reaching the Esplanade.

Bedford Lawn car park (Festival Donor): Opposite Bedford Hotel. Pay as you enter.

The Ham East, Ham West and Roxburgh short stay car parks (EDDC): Charging 8am to 6pm daily. 3 hours max stay, no return within 1 hour.

Manor Road car park (EDDC): Western end of Manor Road. Charging 24 hours daily. 24 hours max stay: no return within 1 hour.

# **Festival Bus Service**

# **Opening Times**

From 12noon on Wednesday 31st
July through to 12noon on Saturday
10th August. On arrival, follow the
instructions from the Campsite
entrance volunteers. All campers must
complete a registration sheet. Cars are
allowed on site for unloading / loading.

### Cars

Once parked no vehicle may move on the Campsite until it leaves the Festival. If you would like to move your car during the festival, please use the Festival Car Park, free to campsite customers, on top of Bulverton Hill. Cars must be parked as indicated by the Campsite Stewarding team. Please note that if the ground conditions are muddy, then we may have to restrict cars onto the site, in which case vehicles will be directed to the Festival Car Park.

# Motorhomes, Caravans & Live-In-Vehicles

A separate area from tents is provided with limited availability. Book in advance. Must remain in situ for the week/booked period, once parked.

### Family Area

There is a designated quieter Family Camping area – please keep the noise here to a minimum after 10:30pm.

### Access

The campsite is based on farmland that is sloping and undulating. There is a dedicated area for people with mobility requirements. Please email access@ sidmouthfolkfestival.co.uk if you would like to pre-book.

# Campfires & BBQ

Campfires and ground-level barbeques are strictly prohibited. Barbecue units are only allowed with the agreement of the Campsite Manager, so please check before buying food. If barbecues are used, then they must be raised off the ground and never use them inside your tent.

# **Facilities**

**Toilets** - including accessible facilities and hand wash basins.

**Showers -** Cubicles including accessible unit for wheelchair users.

**Drinking Water** – There are various taps around the campsite and these will be signposted.

Washing up facilities are available by the main shower and toilet block. Elsan disposal facilities on site.

Main walkways lit by festoon lighting.
Lockable storage (free) – this is
operated during the Campsite Box Office
opening hours only, and available to all
campers. Please note that all items left
must be available for searching prior to
depositing. Storage is locked overnight.
All items are deposited at your own
risk and we are unable to accept any
responsibility for them.

Campsite Catering: There will be morning catering at the Campsite, offering full breakfasts and hot drinks and with an honesty box for provisions during the day.

Waste Disposal: Rubbish bins are at the top of the campsite, by the entrance and between the two fields. Please keep this area tidy. All waste is sorted for recycling offsite.

### Doas

Dogs are permitted on site if kept on a lead and under control at all times. Please exercise your dogs away from the camping areas and clean up after them. Dogs are not allowed within festival venues with the exception of recognised assistance dogs. Find out more:

Drinks are sold in reusable drinks cups at our bars, use them throughout the festival or bring your own. Reusable drink bottles can be refilled at our Water Refill Points around town. These are located at The Ham, the Market Square (on the side of the Market building towards the town), in the 'arches' on the seafront (at the western end of the Esplanade), below the Cricket Ground, at the Campsite and at The Bulverton.

Our caterers sign up to a policy of no polystyrene or single use plastics. We use companies who sort waste offsite to get it to the right recycling facilities in the area.


